This week we said farewell to a very special member of our skating community. Very sadly Bridget Danbrook passed away on 29 October 2020.

A very moving service was held at Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church, Howick, Auckland on 3 November and attended by many people from the skating community. Husband Alan and daughters Tracy and Jess gave lovely tributes to Bridget as wife and mum. A strong, caring and generous spirit.

Bridget made a phenomenal contribution to the administration of our sport. She had been involved in administration at club level since 2008, with NISSA since 2011, and had been a Data/Replay operator since 2012. But it was in her role as Secretary of NZIFSA from 2013 – 2019 that her influence was felt most widely. Always there offering support and providing information and advice. So many people from around the country, including many who had never met her, but had communicated with her on numerous occasions, have felt the loss of her passing.

Bridget was diagnosed with cancer last December and stepped back from her role as Secretary of NZIFSA to focus her energy on recovering. She was so incredibly positive throughout her battle with cancer and until recently was still planning for her future involvement in skating when she was recovered. Bridget loved skating and volunteered many thousands of hours. But her family were her first love. Our thoughts and prayers are with Alan, Jess, Tracy and Chris and their extended family.

## **NEW ZEALAND ICE FIGURE SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS & NEW ZEALAND ADULT SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS, DUNEDIN 24-27 OCTOBER**

We would like to extend a sincere thank you to the DISC organising committee, officials and volunteers for making this such a successful event. This year was even more challenging than most with the added uncertainty around whether we would be able to hold the event and the short lead time between the last qualifying competition and these championships.

Our National Championships are the pinnacle event of our skating calendar and we wish to congratulate all those who met the qualification criteria to be able to compete. We enjoyed some great skating over the four days of competition and all results can be found on the Competitions section of the NZIFSA website: <http://www.nzifsa.org.nz/competitions/>.

We would also like to mention those New Zealand skaters who live and train overseas who were unable to attend Nationals this year. The Board had specified a process in the event that NZ skaters living/training overseas were unable to attend Nationals, either due to travel restrictions or the 14 day quarantine requirement being in place, that they be given the opportunity to be selected to the respective grade for International selection and Australian Nationals. Selection will be subject to evidence of attaining the required TES for International A or B team or Australian Nationals as applicable. Any skaters that meet these selection criteria will be confirmed as last priority in that representative group (i.e. behind skaters who made selection at New Zealand Nationals). In the unlikely situation that we have more than one skater selected via this method, priority between those skaters will be determined by total score. We will notify members if any skaters do qualify via this method.

## **SELECTIONS FROM THE 2020 NEW ZEALAND ICE FIGURE SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS**

The provisional announcement of selection of representative skaters of those that had made the development squads was made at the banquet following the completion of the standard grades at the National Championships and the confirmed selections are listed below.

## **OTHER IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS MADE AT THE NATIONALS BANQUET**

### **Administrator of the Year**

There were four nominations for this award this year and each of the nominees have made a significant contribution to the administration of our sport. The nominees were Katherine Bennetts, Bridget Danbrook, Alan Greenstreet and Fiona Marsh. Fiona Marsh, by dint of her position as Secretary of NZIFSA is not eligible for this award.

### **Criteria:**

- Take on a leadership or integral role in their club/sub association
- Take on administrative/organizational roles and perform their duties in a manner that progresses the sport or enhances the functioning of the club/sub-association.
- Positive role model for other administrators of our sport.
- Possibly work in a mentoring role within the club/sub-association.

### **Katherine Bennetts – Centaurus Ice Skating Club**

Katherine joined the Centaurus committee several years ago and is currently president. She has shown dedication to fostering a positive club environment, continually searching for ways the club can improve and provide assistance for club skaters and promoting the sport through pursuing public recognition of skater achievements. Katherine is a positive role model for volunteers tirelessly contributing to all events regionally and nationally.

### **Bridget Danbrook – Allegro Ice Dance Club**

Bridget is an extremely passionate, dedicated and hardworking member and secretary of the Allegro committee. - Positive and tangible contribution to their club and the sport in general
- Active role in the activities offered by the club and/or skate school, e.g. club nights, fundraising, Kiwi Skate coaching sessions

### **Douglas Gerber - Auckland Ice Figure Skating Club**

Douglas shows great leadership skills and he is always giving advice to younger skaters to help them improve and during competitions is seen motivating other skaters to do their best. He is not only hard working, but also puts a smile on everyone's faces; his happy personality brightens up the rink and practice sessions with him are never a bore

### **The Allchurch Shield**

The Shield is named after Sandy Allchurch and is awarded to the club that gets the highest number of points, based on where their members place in the various grades, at our New Zealand National and Adult Skating Championships. Sandy Allchurch was actively involved in the Association for many years and was at the inaugural meeting in June 1937 of what was, until 2011, the New Zealand Ice Skating Association. Sandy was also Patron for our Association for many years and was very dedicated to supporting ice skating. Being able to present this award each year is a rather special acknowledgement to Sandy and the contribution that he, and others like him, have made to our sport.

The provisional announcement of the Allchurch Shield was made at the banquet. For the first time ever the Allchurch Shield was won by Allegro Ice Dance Club – congratulations.

### **Norman Cameron Cup of Excellence**

The cup is awarded to the skater, couple, pair or team that has excelled in skating over the year, in international competitions (including Australia) or have had an outstanding year in skating. The trophy is only to be awarded if a skater deserves it and fits the above criteria. The Norman Cameron Cup was not awarded this year as the international competition season has been so disrupted that there simply haven't been the same opportunities for skaters to excel in competition.

### **Recognition of Jeanne Begej - Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit**

Flowers were presented to Jeanne Begej to celebrate her being recognised in the Queen's Birthday Honours 2020 for her contribution to figure skating as an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit. Jeanne spoke about her lifelong involvement in skating and how she started judging at age 16 so that she had a better understanding of what the judges were looking for when she was competing.

Jeanne has yet to receive her medal. There was an award ceremony last week, but Jeanne she chose to come and judge at Nationals, and so it may be next year before she gets the chance to be presented with her medal by the Governor General.

### **MEMBER FORUMS AT NATIONALS**

Three member forums were held during our National Championships. A Coaches forum was held to discuss development opportunities and options for coaches to attain the points they need to maintain accreditation. Our Coaching Director, Simone Thornett will be sending out some notes for coaches soon regarding this.

As per usual, a forum to discuss the Rules and Regulations was held. The draft Rules & Regulations have been posted on the NZIFSA website for comment since 1 August. There had been no feedback received to date. The proposed changes to the 2021 Rules & Regulations were discussed, including some useful feedback around what might constitute a conflict of interest for coaches serving on technical panels. There are no changes proposed to sections 600, 700 or 800. The revised draft Rules and Regulations sections 100, 200 and 500 have been posted on the NZIFSA website Member Forums for a further 21 days for feedback.

The final member forum was “What can NZIFSA do for you”. The focus was primarily on what development opportunities we can offer for skaters, coaches and officials given that our borders are likely to stay “closed” for the foreseeable future. The USD10,000 exceptional grant from the ISU gives NZIFSA the opportunity to put some additional resources into development, but we need to make sure we invest it wisely. Based on the suggestions received, NZIFSA are looking to put together a series of camps for skaters that include remote input from high level international coaches. Earlier in the year is the preference as it sets skaters up well for the year and is less disruptive to programme preparation. There was support for “residential” style camps where skaters stay together and train together for 3 – 5 days. We will have more information for our skating community in our next newsletter regarding these camps.
